What is long-term care?

Long-term care includes a wide range of options and services that can be provided in your own home, your community, or places like assisted living facilities and nursing homes. Long-term care services help people with illnesses, disabilities, or other chronic conditions that limit them physically or mentally. Some individuals may require extensive services and





Myths & Truths

Long-term care is a subject too important to be misunderstood or ignored. Planning for long-term care is a good way to prepare for the future, so read along and see if you can tell fact from fiction.

Myth #1

I only need long-term care when I can no longer perform everyday acts like dressing and walking because of a physical disability or illness.

Truth

Although long-term care is often needed because of a disease or injury, such as a stroke or car accident, it is also required by people with conditions like dementia or significant memory loss.

Myth #2

Long-term care is only for the elderly.

Truth

40% of Americans who receive long-term care are working-age adults. While nearly half the U.S. population will require long-term care at some point in their lives, the need can arise in people of any age.
